Councillor Cruise stepped back in

Councillor Farwell stated that questions were asked regarding the appropriation as to what land would be evaluated and on May 9 they received the information. It was estimated at \$793,000 cost for the study and \$85,300,000 to complete. We do not know if we will ever own the property owned by Brockton Iron and Steel. We don't own or control the property. The schools need help, as well as STEM, the math center at the High School could also use the funds. We can get eligibility for reimbursements for the schools. We need a new police station, but this is pie in the sky. We are in need of new streets, and Shaw Center and Rox Stadium need work. He believes that it is unacceptable to not get the info to the council. He urges Council members not to approve this. He feels they should address the city's priorities.

Councillor Beauregard stated that she will vote no. She had a private printer print this out. She found that some buildings have been historic sites. She stated that the Commissioner of Buildings has not been consulted.

Councillor Monahan has concerns and motioned to refer back to Finance Committee and was properly seconded.

Councillor Derenoncourt disagrees with adopting the order. He agrees with Councillor Farwell .that they need to share information more effectively. Based on the lack of information, he does not want to vote on this tonight. He also doesn't agree with Police and Fire stations being together. He believes they should invest in schools and buildings and streets. The paperwork is alot of information to process.

Councillor Sullivan requests from the Council President that we get a written letter from Attorney Nessralla on the property, if we own it and his opinion.

Councillor Farwell stated that the city doesn't own property, and that the \$85 million is too much. They need to move on to more pressing issues.

Councillor Cruise on the motion, stated that this is a valid question, and that eminent domain is used when needed. 5 schools weren't owned when plans were started to build the schools.

Councillor Eaniri voted in favor originally. He has concerns and questions after receiving the paperwork. He also agrees with Councillor Cruise and others. We need more information. He supports sending this back to Finance Committee.

The motion carried by a hand vote with Councillors Farwell and Nicaastro voting in the negative.
