#### MINUTES - ORDINANCE COMMITTEE

June 17, 2020

Out of respect for public health and in response to the Governor's declared state of emergency, this meeting was closed to the public and interested parties were permitted to access the deliberations via a livestream on YouTube and via ZOOM. This meeting was held in accordance with Governor Charlie Baker's signed open meeting law order dated March 12, 2020 which relieves a public body from the requirement of section 20 of chapter 30A that it conduct its meetings in a public place that is open and physically accessible to the public, provided that the public body makes provision to ensure public access to the deliberations of the public body for interested members of the public through adequate, alternative means.

The Standing Committee on Ordinances and Rules was called to order at 6:12 p.m. by Councilor Cruise with Councilors Cruise, Monahan, Eaniri, Rodrigues and Thompson present.

<u>MOTION</u> by Councilor Thompson to insert "The City of Brockton maintains a sincere commitment to the principles of equal employment opportunity, affirmative action and non-discrimination in order to rectify past and present patterns of discrimination. This policy applies to every aspect of employment, including the recruitment, hiring and terms and conditions of service of all full-time and part-time municipal employees. Employment decisions shall be made in accordance with state and federal law and without regard to race, creed, color, religion, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity, age, or physical/mental disability." after the first sentence of Section 2-379, 2<sup>nd</sup> by Councilor Monahan. Motion carried unanimously.

<u>MOTION</u> by Councilor Thompson to insert ", with the Mayor's approval," after the word Director in the second sentence and fix a scrivener's error to state "an" Assistant Director instead of "and Assistant Director", 2<sup>nd</sup> by Councilor Monahan. Motion carried unanimously.

**MOTION** by Councilor Thompson to strike the works "human resource" from Section 2-381(2), and insert "EEO," before ADA and ", FMLA" before and FLSA in the same section, 2<sup>nd</sup> by Councilor Monahan. Motion carried unanimously.

**MOTION** by Councilor Thompson to insert the following subsections (3) and (4), respectively, to Section 2-381 and thereafter change the corresponding numerical value so that the section is 1-11, "(3) Work with City's legal counsel and other relevant staff to coordinate City's response to all reports and/or complaints of discrimination; (4) Serve as City's ADA coordinator;", 2<sup>nd</sup> by Councilor Monahan. Motion carried unanimously.

**MOTION** by Councilor Thompson to insert the following language to Sec. 2-381A after "shall be deleted in its entirety":

"I. Subject to the provisions of applicable collective bargaining agreements, Massachusetts State Wide Records Retention Schedule and applicable state and federal law, the following shall apply to employment with the city.

A. Every vacant position shall be advertised on the city's website, in the news media and/or social media, and on such other job boards or websites as the Human Resources director shall deem appropriate. The posting of an open position shall be for at least fourteen (14) calendar days. If a position is posted and remains vacant after ninety (90) days a new posting shall be made to attract an updated list of applicants. A record shall be kept of each posting and the dates and places when the posting appeared.

B. The Human Resources director shall use best efforts to obtain all relevant information from prior employment references and personal references prior to selection for employment with the City of Brockton.

C. Every appointment or promotion in a department shall be accompanied by written certification from the department head that the most qualified person was selected." 2<sup>nd</sup> by Councilor Monahan. Motion carried unanimously.

(30 years at property, minimal employee parking at existing site, occasional disruption from ambulances, 200 yards, 60 yards form his front door, ownership/townhouses, island of owners, double population and motor vehicle uses, traffic avoidance issue, market rate housing question, standards after development, appreciates developer wants to develop in Brockton, could be further down the street, this will greatly affect the neighborhood)

#### Paul Ware, 161 Healy Terrace

(lives with life partner, lots of emails, spoke at planning board meeting, spoke to ½ of the residents in this area, universally opposed to zoning overlay and apartment plans, doesn't see need/rationale for apartment complex in this area, parking concerns, congestion, traffic impact assessment questions, had heard no affordable or low income housing, concerns her \$0v, up to 20% could be low income housing)

#### Kris Minschaella, 31 Nyland Road

(repetitive of last night at planning, appraisal business in Brockton, neighbors there 40 or more years, all opposed to high density housing, purchased in this area because it was Brockton heights, tenants are transient, commercial properties leave a night, seniors not able to find access to ZOOM but calling and stopping her, notes left in her mail box, Rob May contractor her and neighborhood, traffic study comment and Hancock School. 40v development requires exemptions, doesn't see need for so many units, feels this was a done deal already)

# Tim Almeida, 39 Nyland Road

(visited14 acre sit in Walpole, different demographic, how can you promise no subsidized housing)

#### Mona Lisa Andrade, 40 Alandale

(born and raised in Brockton, parents live there was well, Mom worked at nursing home, federal law enforcement officer, more break-ins, moved to area for a reason, the residents/neighborhood opposed to it, traffic concern)

#### Susan Purpura, 114 Cashman Road

(agrees with what all the other residents have said, traffic concern, cars go fast in this area, concerned about 200 units in a small area, massive amount of people, parking, unwanted activity, volume of people is overwhelming)

#### Carrie Ruit Ragion, 9 Nylon Road

(walks children to school, crossing guard not acknowledged by traffic, traffic concerns already, kids in this area have to walk to school, not safe to cross Pearl Street, why not consider high quality senior care facility for this area)

# Joise Butler, 169 Healy Terrace

(seen it all and heard it all, skeptical about 40v option and whether this will be market rate housing, bought her property for a quiet neighborhood, cut-through traffic already a concern, congestion, traffic signs hit and knocked down, not in favor of it, homeownership in the area, single family homes was a factor for them when buying, not confident in what the developer is saying, concerning as new residents, invested a lot into small property in this area)

#### Ray Creedon, 120 Healy Terrace

(40 years at his property, one of the biggest concerns is traffic, valuation of homes, traffic at lights, 300 more cars would be dramatic, left on Pearl Street need to cross 2 lanes of traffic, other commercial options to be considered)

## Joan Creedon, 120 Healey Terrace

(40 years resident since she was born, traffic problem, cut-through, seen the area in Walpole, not near densely populated street, should have 2 street egress, traffic has been building up, not going to have a quiet neighborhood, does not want a quick decision)
